Good Bye Wendell

Wendell JeanPierre was born in California; but he never claimed it. He was raised and educated in New Orleans, and without hurricane Katrina, would have finished his life there. However, it was here in Texas that Wendall passed away on October 12th, 2022 with his wife Connie at his side, from a massive stroke a few days before. Wendell has always been an intellectual man having graduated from Saint Augustine High – a famous Catholic High School in New Orleans. Even today, through the St. Augustine Alumni Association, he and his classmates continue to inspire young men to be men of the world through scholarships and counsel. After high school Wendell entered the military where he was an Ammo

Tech. That’s a fancy term to describe defusing bombs. He served in Viet Nam and landed in country on his birthday – Wendell thought that was a good omen. While he survived his tour and received numerous medals and an honorable discharge, he was granted 100% disability. After his military career he was educated at Dillard College and then SUNO – Southern University New Orleans. He spent nearly his entire working career as a Duty Board Supervisor for the United States Coast Guard. He retired in 2005 just about 3 months before hurricane Katrina arrived and deposited 10 feet of water in their home. They decided, for safety reasons, to seek a home in Texas. . Wendell was an avid reader and writer. He knew the bible forward and backward and was well versed in scripture and all the books of the bible. He utilized this knowledge to teach others about “the way, the light, and the truth”. He was chaplain of the St. Augustine Alumni Association and Lecturer for the Knights of Columbus. Wendell was a startling surprise to the Knight of Columbus because of his knowledge of church history and scripture. He was a perfect fit to be the Lecturer for Council 8157, a post he held until his death. Our Council had the privilege of his knowledge and counsel during his years as a member of our Council. He was inducted into the 4th degree of the Knights of Columbus and participated in ceremonial duties. We never got to hear Wendell play his clarinet but he was a musician and able to play a variety of instruments – the best being the clarinet. Wendell and Connie have been blessed with three children – Kelly, Maceo, and Malcolm. Around the house everyone called him Chef JeanPierre and no one was allowed in his kitchen. During his short time with the Knights of

Columbus, it was obvious that Wendell was not feeling well and yet he always had a happy disposition. You just couldn't meet a nicer guy. We'll miss him a lot.

The last chapter of this story occurred on Tuesday evening December 6, 2022, when Connie JeanPierre presented Council #8157 a three layer cake with our logo on front in recognition of the Knights support, love and honor the council displayed during Wendell's funeral.

Marian Marian Lechoslaw "Les" Migala, born in Zyrardow, Poland on July 27, 1928, passed away peacefully on November 8, 2022, surrounded by his children. As a youth, he served in the Zwiazek Harcerstwa Polskiego (Polish Scouting Association) supporting the Resistance during WWII. He escaped Soviet Poland to Paris, France without papers where

a cousin could confirm his identity, learned French, and attended the University of Paris-Sorbonne and the *École Spéciale d'Architecture*. He immigrated to the United States in 1964, learned English, and began his architectural career at the Lit Brothers Department Store in Philadelphia, PA. Anne (his wife) and he assisted in establishing what would become the National Shrine of Our Lady of Czestochowa in Doylestown, PA during which they met and worked with the future Pope and Saint, John Paul II. He then began his 33-year career with the Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES), moving his family to Baltimore, MD, Bangkok, Thailand, Duncanville, Texas, and Munich Germany, before returning to settle in Duncanville. Les and his family became charter members of Holy Spirit Catholic Church, where he assisted in the architectural design of the new church. He remained active in the Holy Spirit community throughout his life, as an Usher, a Cursillisto, and a 4th Degree Knight of Columbus. He bravely and with unflinching humor fought the disease that ultimately claimed his life, spending the last years traveling with his children to places he had never had a chance to visit and returning to those most important to him. His children took him to Tahiti to visit his niece, to visit Rome, the Holy Land, and Fatima, Portugal. Six years ago, they took him to visit the Parthenon in Athens, Greece-a lifelong dream and the foundation of his architectural studies-and to Zyrardow, to introduce his family to his ancestral home. "Les," as he was known during his professional career, was blessed to have lived a full life and the legacy of his devotion to his family will always be evident through their faith and accomplishments. By way of example, the influence of his bravery, sense of humor, spirit of adventure, and character of goodwill lives on in his five children – Therese, Witold, Henri, Arthur, and Alexander. For sure, the Knights of Columbus will always have fond memories of Les. Rest in Peace old friend.

Farwell Pat



Patrick Joseph May passed away on December 16, 2022. He was born in Chicago, Illinois on May 24, 1929. Pat enlisted in the Air Force while attending his first year of college at St. Mary's in Minnesota where he served from 1948 – 1952. He married his wife of 69 years – Betty- in 1950 and settled at Wichita Falls at Sheppard AFB. While in the Air Force, Pat specialized as an aircraft mechanic and instructor. His trade and passion for aircraft took him to Vought Aircraft Corp. in Dallas where he had the opportunity to work on some of the most famous fighter planes of that period, including his favorite, the F8 Crusader. With a growing family at home, Pat decided to continue his education and took a position at Texas Instruments while attending night school at Arlington State College where he graduated in 1967 with a degree in mathematics. He spent the remainder of his career at TI's Central Research laboratory

where he contributed to the infrared technology development that was deployed on projects such as Voyager 1 and Voyager 2 deep space exploration probes, as well as the Hubble telescope. After retirement he volunteered as an aircraft mechanic at the Cavanaugh Flight Museum in Addison where he maintained vintage WWII aircraft and was a member of a restoration team that rebuilt and conducted a cross country flight of a vintage PT-19 Cornell "Rosalie" that remains on display at the museum. He was an avid reader, enjoying science, history, and technical fiction. In spite of his success, he was a very humble and kind man with a big heart and a caking to serve. His priorities were his family and his Catholic faith. He enjoyed family trips to Chicago, weekend camping, and any other outing that brought family together. His time with the Knight of Columbus will be remember by his big smile and his quick wit. He could deliver a "zinger" with the best of them. He was Director of Church Activities for many years keeping the Council abreast of upcoming event involving the Church. He served as an Assistant Scoutmaster in Boy Scouts, and served as the equipment manager and president of his dive club. Pat was the head usher (as they were called back then), at Holy Spirit Church making sure there were an adequate number at each Mass and directing their actions. Pat is preceded in death by his beloved wife Betty, his first born son, Patrick III, his parents, sister, and brother. He is survived by his remaining children, Mary Hayes (husband Steve), Teresa Barnard (husband Jody), Tim May (wife Kathy), and Susan May, as well as 10 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. When Holy Spirit administrators – especially Tammie Marceleno, Outreach Coordinator for Holy Spirit asked Knight Hands to “spruce up” the food pantry room, David Dybala, Director of Knight Hands said “sure”.



And so on Saturday morning November 19th around 7:30am eleven (11) Knights gathered to do the job. The job entailed dismantling the present shelving, adding new and improved lighting, added more electrical outlets, move one storage rack and after painting reinstall it, clean up the four walls and then paint the room. With wrenches and screw guns the old shelving was taken down and disassembled and discarded. Bolts end protruding from the cement wall were cut off and the walls were scrapped and caulked in preparation for painting.

After taping off the room around the door casings and other objects the painting began with a couple guys using rollers and even more guys using brushes to ‘cut-in’ at the ceiling line and around the floor molding and the door casings.



All went swimmingly and by 11:30 the bulk of the work was complete – just a few electrical tasks on Monday. In total Knight Hands worked about 54 hours to complete this task.
