Tribute to Our Fallen Brothers



Devoted husband, father, Catholic and patriot, Council 8157 member Ralph Harkenrider passed away on Feb. 4 at the age of 88. He is survived by Maxine, his wife of more than 63 years (whom he met in the first grade), their six daughters (Joan Harkenrider of Irving, Monica Radoszewski of Dallas, Donna Bullis of Carlisle, Pa., Laure Jones of Wytheville, Va., Lisa Brochu of Barrington, Ill., and Amy Manning of Nokesville, Va.), 15 grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Ralph was a Chicago native graduated from the Catholic all-boys Mt. Carmel High School and made sure that all of their daughters also received a Catholic education. He earned a law degree from DePaul University in Chicago. Ralph served in the Army Air Corps during World War II, in the Air Force during the Korean War and later in the Air Force Reserve. In combining his legal training and military experience, he became a JAG advocate. Ralph and Maxine were married in Chicago in January 1950, when he was in the service. He joined the Knights in January 1949, took his major degree in

May 1950 and entered the Fourth Degree in June 1951. Ralph served as a lawyer in Chicago before spending most of his career representing pilots' unions. He was a founding administrator of the Airline Pilots Association for American Airlines. The Harkenriders came to Texas from New York in 1970, when he was transferred here, and were among Holy Spirit's founding families in 1974. Maxine worked for International Harvester in Chicago. In Texas, she operated a hot dog-deli stand in downtown Fort Worth. The Harkenriders were beloved by many in the parish. Among those are our own Larry Balagna and his wife, Shiela, who likewise lived in Illinois. Soon after the Balagnas arrived and became parishioners in 1995, they and the Harkenriders had a standing date just about every Friday night. When the couples went out instead of dining in, the destination often was either Sam's Pizza and Pasta in Cedar Hill or Henk's Black Forest in Dallas. Though Ralph was slowed in recent years, he still attended KC meetings on occasion – and usually made his presence known. (No fence-straddler, Ralph.) He was a member of the American Legion and once led the local Memorial Day parade. He loved music, singing (a member of both the Holy Spirit choir and the Dallas Frohsinn Singing Society) and telling jokes. Little known fact: Ralph once owned a pecan farm in Texas. His other hobbies included polka, traveling, gardening, tinkering with cars, beer tasting and root-beer brewing. We're better Knights, parishioners and people for knowing Ralph Harkenrider.



Mary Kay Whitacre said “I am most proud of how Jack served his country, how together we always lived our wedding vows and proud of him for just being him”. Those were mild words for a decorated war hero, a member of the Cherokee Nation and father of two children. Jack was born in Los Angeles California on September 18, 1948 and moved to Amarillo Texas when he was 3 months old. Jack enter the military service in 1966 and served three consecutive tours in Viet Nam during which time, as a Medic, he was credited and decorated for saving the life of General Westmoreland by carrying him out of a mine field after the Generals’ helicopter was downed. Jack was also wounded during his tours. He remained in the National Guard when he was separated from active duty until 1983. While in Viet Nam he was engaged to May Kay, whom he married in 1969 and then

moved to Dallas. Jack, being an ever practical joker, used his military cigarette lighter as an engagement promise. Jack and May Kay worked and moved a number of times in the Dallas Metroplex including Duncanville, Little Elm, Grand Prairie, Garland, Mesquite, and Glen Heights. Daughter, Angel, was born in 1973 and son, Janoah, was born in 1977. Jack’s expertise was computer technology which served the family well during his time at Reserve Life Insurance and as computer engineer at SMU and MCI World Com until he suffered a heart attack in 1999 and was unable to return to work. Jack was always a motorcycle rider and Mary Kay recalls the time he and his buddies rode to Oklahoma and Jack ran into a bull. No one was injured from that accident; but the aftermath of Jack’s 2004 motorcycle accident landed him in a wheelchair. Jack Lester Whitacre “POPPY” passed away on Saturday, February 02, 2013 at the age of 64. He was a citizen of the Cherokee Nation and was named Eagle Eyes because of how well he watched over his children. He never faltered in his love and adoration for anyone he considered family which was everyone. He raised and guided many children during some of the worst times of their lives. Mary Kay recalled the time he came home to find the living filled with troubled kids and one of them was in his driveway parking spot. His outlook on life and ability to fight anything that life threw at him was remarkable and should be an inspiration to all of us. His strength will continue on through his grandchildren: Logan and Lorelai.

We Will Miss Them

In early February, the council (and the parish) bade farewell and good luck to Marce Tebbe as he and wife Brenda moved back to Illinois to tend to Marce’s mother and Brenda’s parents. Marce was a valued member of 8157 from the time that the Tebbes relocated to north Texas in 1998. He served as our Grand Knight for the 2001-02 fraternal year, his term cut short when the State Deputy asked him to assume the office of Diocesan Deputy. Various other titles since joining our council included State Charities Director, State Program Director, State Council Growth Director and State Liturgy Director. In recent years, one of his primary roles in the council was as director of Pro-Life activities. Each year, Brenda and Marce were involved in the events held in conjunction with the anniversary of the *Roe v. Wade* abortion decision, the Hike for Life walks in the fall and the Bishop’s Pro Life dinner. The Tebbes were involved in the parish’s RCIA program, served as Extraordinary Eucharistic Ministers and helped out at parish activities and functions almost too numerous to list. (OK, we’ll list a few: Vacation Bible School, the Fall Festival, the parish’s mission trip to Honduras, setting up for Easter



Masses.) Brenda was among the founders of the parish’s Catholic Daughters of the Americas court in 2000 and served as its regent. They have returned to Edwardsville, Ill., their previous parish (Our Lady Queen of Peace in nearby Bethalto) and Marce to KC Council 4688. When the Tebbes’ deeds were cited in previous 8157 newsletters, here’s what they had to say about their contributions to the parish. Marce: “I have a strong passion to serve others. I get direct and immediate personal satisfaction when I am able to help someone.” Brenda: “My motto is, ‘Find a need, and fill it!’ I get so much more back than I give.” We’re so glad you folks did. Good luck, and God bless you.

Family of the Month

January — You might be excited to know Mike and Susan are already planning the big Saturday dinner to be served during the next Fall Festival. They'll be going with brisket and have already conducted a taste test of rubs, back in December. They've become the first family of Festival cooking, having previously provided chicken and then beer-can turkey (a Thanksgiving theme that including cornbread dressing, green beans and carrots). With Mike's affinity for grilling, Susan gave him a literal big surprise for his birthday in 2011 – and smoker and trailer measuring 14 feet. (They brought it to the last Festival.) Mike's strategy for preparing something like brisket is relatively simple: "Go slow." For the December tasting at their Ovilla home on a Saturday night, he began by marinating on Thursday, started up the smoker on Friday afternoon and was done about 24 hours later. February—Dan and Pat are one of a handful of couples belonging to the Knights of Columbus council and the Catholic Daughters of the Americas court that are affiliated with Holy Spirit. Dan was the council's Grand Knight during the fraternal years of 2002-03 and 2003-04. Pat participates in the Tuesday night Bible study. She is also one of the parish's Zone Shepherds, whose annual duties include organizing the reception for our newest Catholics following the Easter Vigil Mass and the Pentecost Picnic (she particularly likes to help with the kids' games in the gym). They collectively are Eucharistic Minister captains. Dan will don his apron during Lent and oversee the KC crew that cooks for the weekly fish fries. The parish fish fries started during Dan's term as Grand Knight when Father Tim Heines sought an alternative to the soup suppers that had been held. Knight of the Month



January—Marce Tebbe displayed a wide range of skills and interests during December and January alone. When the parish’s annual Breakfast with St. Nick was in need of a new St. Nick (Leo Mattingly was recovering from eye surgery), and Marce answered the call. He and wife Brenda have helped with the decorations, set-up and operations of the breakfast for years, so it was simply a different role. “I love interacting with children and had a wonderful time talking to about 200 that morning,” he said. (Hope he didn’t promise anybody a Red Ryder rifle; you’ll shoot your eye out, kid.) Marce has been the council’s director for Pro-Life activities and was busy in mid-January as usual with the annual events held in downtown Dallas in connection with *Roe v. Wade*, this year being the 40th anniversary of the Dallas court decision that legalized abortion in the United States. He and Brenda participated in the memorial Mass, march and rally. The Tebbes became active in Dallas diocesan Pro-Life functions soon after moving to north Texas in 1998, and Marce became secretary of the Hike for Life board of directors 10 years ago. “Support of the unborn has always been a passion of mine that I hope will continue to grow in others that we have touched,” he said.

February—Art is a New Yorker by birth and north Texan since the Air Force sent him to Carswell AFB in 1955. He is our co-director for youth activities, right-hand man to Larry Dumais. In January alone, Art was part of the KC contingent that ran the two free-throw contests and also helped at the catechist dinner and the winter blood drive. He was front and center for the spaghetti dinner on Feb. 23 that will help the youth fund their mission trip to Chattanooga, Tenn., next summer. He’s also part of our degree team, serving as the Outside Guard. Art served in both the Air Force (1952-56) and the Army (1958-77) as a helicopter and airplane mechanic. Following the lead of Italian chef Art Senato, council members prepared and served a *bellissimo* spaghetti dinner to a gathering of 190 people on Saturday evening, Feb. 23 to help the parish’s youth ministry fund a mission trip to Tennessee next June. It was Art and his fellow co-director for council youth activities, Larry Dumais, who concocted the fund-raising idea months ago when the parish youth were originally looking ways to defray costs for a trip to Honduras. When federal policies made that trip impossible, the excursion was simply rerouted to Chattanooga’s “Alive in You” program and the meal went on as scheduled. Devyn Scheuch, Holy Spirit’s director of youth and young adult ministry, said the dinner raised more than \$2,000. “I’m so grateful for everything the Knights did for the event,” said Devyn, who especially thanked Larry, Art and Grand Knight Frank Salazar. Other Knights who participated included Andy Goza, Bob Lamb, Tom Greco, Juan Chapa, Ken Struck (and wife Diane), Jack Ramsden (and wife Juanita), Al Alonzo, John Espree, Ed O’Brien and Jorge Ruiz. March for Life in Dallas

The theme of this year's events was "**Exodus 20:13 Thou Shalt Not Kill.**" As Bishop Farrell explained, it "is a fitting reminder from Almighty God in the year 2013, the 40th year of the legalized killing of the unborn, that life is sacred and must be protected and that the killing must end." The morning of January 19th 2013, began with a Jericho walk around Routh Street abortion center, with **Bishop Mark Seitz, Vicar of Clergy Father Greg Kelly, and Fr. Kyle Walterscheid** of University of North Texas joining in prayer. Following the rosary, the Roe Memorial Mass, attended by over 3,000 (overflowing into the Grand Salon and the Cathedral Plaza), was co-

celebrated by **Bishops Kevin Farrell, Doug Deshotel and Mark Seitz**, and diocesan clergy. **Fr. Zach Webb** delivered the homily, reminding us that changing the law is not enough; we must devote ourselves to converting hearts through God's love to embrace life. And at the close of Mass, and a parallel worship service at First Baptist, over 10,000 people took to the streets to March for Life to the rally outside the Earle Cabell federal court house where *Roe* was first filed in 1970. During the Rally, **Bishop Farrell** challenged attendees to be activists for Life not just on the anniversary of *Roe v. Wade*, but throughout the year. Bishop Farrell's call to action was followed by the inspirational presentations of **Richard Ellis**, radio host and pastor of Reunion Church; New Wave Feminists founder **Destiny Herndon-De La Rosa**; **Chris Wheel** of the Fatherhood Ministry at Oak Cliff Bible Fellowship; and **Reverend James Flynn** of the Fort Worth Diocese, plus the powerful testimony of abortion survivor **Angela Martinez Balderaz**.

Many Hands Make Light Work

That was certainly the theme for the 2013 Lenten fish fries held from February 15th thru March 22nd – a total of 6 events. During that time 48 Knights contributed their time and effort in making these events successful. 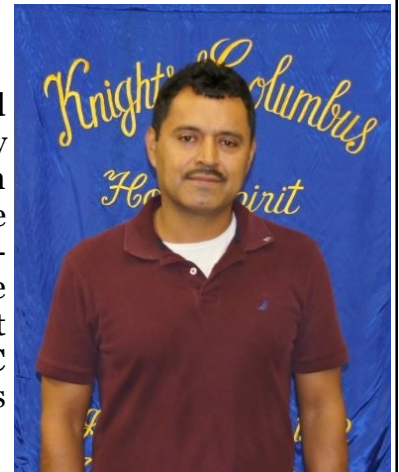

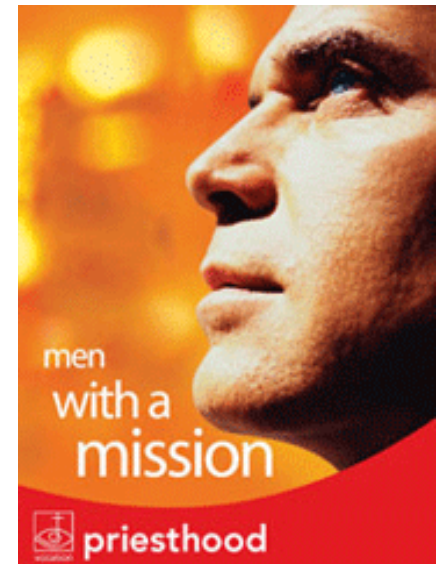
