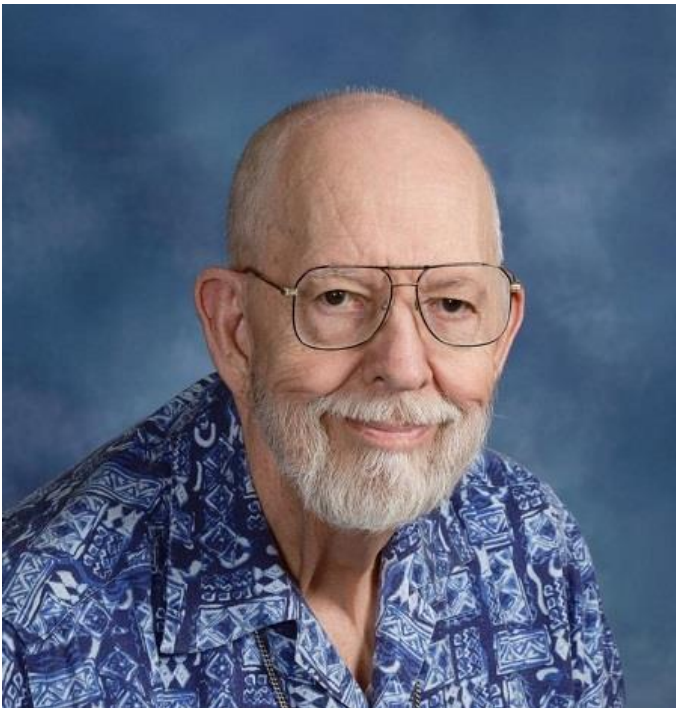

Holy Spirit Catholic Church – Duncanville, Tx,



SK Leslie McKean Alt, a longtime deacon at Holy Spirit and a brother Knight since 1987, died on Tuesday, Jan. 17 at age 87.

Les was ordained on June 6, 1987 — wife Fran was one of the readers at the ordination ceremony at St. Pius X — and joined our order the following December. He took his major degree in January 1988 and entered the Fourth Degree in September 2006. He was later honored as a Life Member. Les served as a deacon until August 2005.

Les was born in Dallas, and his family moved to Duncanville while he was in high school. That's where he met Fran, and they were married on May 24, 1947. That fall, he enlisted in what was then called the U.S. Army Air Corps. He was stationed across Europe and in Hawaii. Les rose to the rank of Chief Master Sergeant and retired from the U.S. Air Force in 1968.

He went on to work for the government's Civil Service Commission, which became the Office of Personnel Management, and then as an administrative officer at LTV in Grand Prairie as a civilian member of the U.S. Navy before retiring in 1986.

The Alts had five children: Andrea "Andi" Griffith, Denise McClung (who died of breast cancer in 2003), Phylis Hildreth, Maria Hines and David Alt. There are 12 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren — with a 12th due in July.

During the vigil at Holy Spirit on Sunday, Jan. 29, Deacon Al Evans noted that Deacon Les "let go of himself and lived for others." In closing his remarks before conducting the Rosary, Deacon Al encouraged all in attendance to give a hug to those around them in memory of Deacon Les' signature greeting.

"He loved people, and he loved to give hugs," said Andi Griffith, who lives in Duncanville. "It

didn't matter how old you were or what gender. He had a genuine affection for people. Some people are even hard to like, but he loved everybody."

Les and Fran converted to Catholicism, and most of their children didn't follow them into the faith. One of the brothers-in-law is Craig Hines, who operates an online ministry and teaches adult education at the non-denominational Christ Church in Irving. Craig recalls his trepidation in asking to marry Maria since he wasn't Catholic. Instead, he said Les' response was: "As long as you can make her happy, I don't care if you're Zen Buddhist."

"Les always treated all of the son-in-law's like they were one of his sons," Craig said. "I love my father a lot, but to be quite honest, as far as relating to me as an adult, Les was just fantastic. He was a great listener and always provided fantastic counsel – for all of us guys. We would talk about our personal walks with Christ.

"The thing about Les – he wouldn't just give you unsolicited advice. He would wait for you to come to him. He might say something to the effect, 'Are you OK? Do you need to talk?' He would never say, 'If I were you, I'd do this.' Unless you asked him."

Les was inspirational in our own Al Evans deciding to become a deacon.

"He was very informative about the diaconate and what was involved in forming to the diaconate," Al said. "I was encouraged all the more to pursue it. It felt like the right thing to do." So much so that Al asked Les 5 1/2 years later to be the honored person to first place the vestments on him. As was also the case with Paul Wood.

"I was deeply, deeply moved by his ministry," Al said. "Les had a spirituality that was really, really

appealing to me and to other people. He had intense love and compassion for others."

When Al learned that Les didn't have long to live, he visited him as soon as he could, his dear friend no longer conscious.

"I tried to be as loving and caring to him as he would have been," Al said.

At the vigil service, the family made available the transcript of one of Deacon Les' favorite homilies. It expounded on the Parable of the 10 Virgins from the Book of Matthew. He implored us to be vigilant and passionate about our faith long before we seek the Lord's mercy:

*"Consider all that the Lord has done for you and then look at all you need to be doing for the Lord. If you heed his Word and obey his Will, then you'll be filled with His Grace and His Spirit. Why not let the Lord fill your lamps with his oil of salvation, and with his saving power that will get you all the way home. The time is now to us to get ready, be ready and stay ready for the Lord's return. **Whatever you do from this day forth, don't get caught without any oil in your vessel!"***

Baseball is Underway

Little League baseball began with a “bang” this past weekend of February 25th and 26th as Cedar Hill Baseball hosted 50 teams out of a 171 team Metroplex NIT tournament. Those 50 teams played 61 games at Valley Ridge Park on Saturday and Sunday and 31 games were played at Dot Thomas Park as well on Saturday and Sunday. Since the weather was cool, few drinks were sold; but the hot cooked food was a real hit. The two locations served about 700 hot dogs, 350 Nachos, at least 100 servings of chicken nuggets, countless French fries – well you get the idea how busy everyone was who volunteered during the tournament.

Frank Salazar and Jim Russell kicked off the activities at 7:00am at Dot Thomas; Jim Kowalski and Dick Bates worked the middle shift and Mike Rumsey and Jim Stavinoha work the very late (until 10pm) last shift. On Sunday at Dot Thomas, Mario Ramos and Jesse Radillo begin the day at 7:00am and were relieved by Peter and Bimbo Perta who worked the middle shift. The final shift was very late again, but Chris Kubin and Dan Keough stuck it out until the end (again about 10pm).

While Dot Thomas was operating, John Espree, Arthur Migala, Hector Rubio, Dan Kurtenback and his two sons B.J and Josh worked the first shift at Valley Ridge starting at 7am. Eric Conner, Russell Gully, Steve Castillo, Hector Lopez, and Ray Rivera handled the very busy middle shift. Games were being played on all 5 fields. Jorge Ruiz, Cathy Ruiz, and Jose Montoya worked the closing shift (also concluding around 10pm). On Sunday Mike Fitzgerald, Chris Edwards, Trevor Edwards, and Tom Greco handled the early shift again starting at 7am. David Dybala, Jerry Jacob, Toni Jacob, Jan Araki, Tony Almanza and Eric Conner worked the middle shift and Roy Cormier, Rod Kinard, and Dan Murphy closed out the tournament late Sunday night. A very special thank you to Eric Conner who worked extra-long on Saturday afternoon and then helped again for nearly 5 hours on Sunday. Special thanks to Jose Montoya who worked with only 30 minutes notice.

In total these Knights worked approximately 192 hours for which they generated about \$3800 in income; so for each hour worked these Knights and Knightettes generated nearly \$20 per hour. What a wonderful way to start out 2017. To those who decided to work during this tournament, the baseball committee (James Smith and Andy Goza – buyers; Greg Warr – accountant; Mike Rumsey – maintenance) thanks you so much for your time and effort. This will probably be the only “thank you” you will receive so know that your work was much appreciated.

The baseball season has extended beyond the initial tournament. In fact, since the opening tournament depicted on page 4, Knights have participated in an additional 120 games and have generated a large sum of income. The regular season league began on March 25th and will continue until the end of May. In addition Southwest Classic has also scheduled numerous games usually on Monday and Thursday evenings. All league games are scheduled on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday evenings and all day Saturdays. Thus far Knights have been involved in 4 tournaments and these are held on Saturday and Sunday.

Knight Hands Progress Report

I am once again humbled by the work that Knights are doing in the parish community to help those in need. It is not easy for someone to ask for help. Everyone wants to take care of themselves; but sometimes more is needed. And that is when Knight Hands comes into the picture. Since the publication of the January Newsletter, Knight Hands has completed 13 projects. They range from 1 hour of work to 35 hours of work. A number of these projects involved repairing or replacing yard fences. Knight Hands also replaced two sets of brake pads during this period. Knight Hands also replaced a water heater and repaired a leaking water line. It doesn't seem to matter what the problems are – Knight Hands has the talent and the desire to solve the issue.

Just to clarify a few things about Knight Hands. First of all, all Knight Hand projects must be recommended by a member of this Council. The projects should be in the parish area community. Anyone is eligible for assistance if: 1. they are unable to do the work themselves; 2. they have no friends, neighbors, or relative to do the work for them; 3 they own the home; and 4. they agree to sign a “hold harmless” agreement. All material necessary to complete a project is paid for by the Knights of Columbus – there is never a charge for work performed. All work is performed by a minimum of two Knight Hands. Liability insurance is provided by the Knights of Columbus and personal injury insurance is provided by each Knight Hands own personal insurance. All tools are provided by Knights Hands. Any Knight can be a Knight Hand.
